2) Explore Business Analyst Job Postings

One really important area to be aware of at this stage is that there are a wide variety of business analyst job roles – not all jobs with the title of "business analyst" actually have the responsibilities. And not all business analyst job roles have a title.

The easiest way to learn the variations, especially of the roles in your local area, is to review active job postings.

- Evaluate a broad selection of job postings, as many as 10 or more, with the business analyst job titles. What are the common skills across all or more jobs? What are the unique skills?
- Can you find at least 3 job postings that are actually business analyst roles, but don't have the title?



✓ You've considered your career choice and decided that "YES" you
want to be a business analyst.

INTENTIONAL BA



At this stage, you are actively and consciously pursuing a business analyst career.

The business analysis profession has what's considered a "chicken and egg" dilemma. Most BA job roles require experience, so how can you get the experience without the

BA job role?

It's simple really and the action steps in this stage will help you develop your BA mindset and assess your transferable skills so you can create your first "official" BA opportunity.

Action Steps

1) Identify Transferable Business Analyst Skills

As you start cultivating your BA mindset by consciously and intentionally applying the BA techniques in your current work, you'll be better able to assess your transferable skills.

Most often, mid-career professionals with some career experience have some transferable skills. For example:

A sales person or customer service professional tends to have great communication and relationship-building skills, and can ask questions to understand the problem the customer wants to solve with their solution.



- A software developer tends to understand what good requirements look like, and how to analyze the functional software capabilities of a system. They also have good exposure to IT projects.
- ➤ A quality assurance engineer understands what high-quality, testable requirements look like.
- A business subject matter expert understands how the business functions and what delivers value to the business.

No matter your career or professional background, you have some transferable skills. These are your positions of strength in pursuing a BA career.

2) Perform BA Techniques

Action creates clarity – and action creates opportunity. You start a business analyst career not by waiting for your first "official" role to come to you, but by doing business analysis in your current work.

You are ready to move to the next stage when...

✓ You are assigned to your first project as a business analyst.

OFFICIAL BA



At this stage, you are officially assigned to your first project as a business analyst. This could be big or small – from a week-long mini-project to a multi-year mega project. But it's a project and you are a business analyst (even if you don't have the title).

You could find this opportunity by being hired into a new role, or promoted into a role in your current company. Or it may be a new project assignment without a promotion or even a volunteer/pro bono project assignment.

Now, because BA roles vary significantly, you may not do everything a BA does, but you will do most of it in a structured way.

Action Steps

1) Manage Expectations

One of the most important actions you need to take in this phase is to manage expectations – of yourself and for your manager, stakeholders, and any team members.

Business analyst roles vary widely and it's incredibly likely that this particular role won't match up with what you've experienced elsewhere or learned about the profession. Just by being here in the Circle of Success and doing a little research, you might be more aware of what a BA does than those who hired you.



2) Apply the Business Analysis Process Framework

As you manage expectations, you also want to be providing leadership and guidance on what a business analyst is actually supposed to do.

Leveraging and applying the Bridging the Gap 8 Step Business Analysis Process Framework is a great place to start.

It's important to avoid re-inventing the wheel here. While it might seem like your project or organization is unique, time and again we've seen the same basic steps, techniques, and principles help business analysts across the world in all kinds of industries and types of projects be successful.

3) Seek To Apply the Full-Range of BA Responsibilities

In order to apply the full range of business analysis responsibilities, you may need to seek out new projects, new roles, and new assignments. Be on the lookout for opportunities to move into an expanded business analysis role and contribute more value to your organization.



PROVEN BA



At this stage, you have a solid track record as a business analyst. You continue to refine your skills and experience with additional projects, and gain exposure to new skills. You enhance your value to the organization by refining your role to focus on what you are best at and can excel at.

2) Seek BA Work in New Environments

A critical aspect of going from proven to super hero is that you become comfortable working in new domains, with new stakeholders, and in new environments.

You are ready to move to the next stage when...

✓ You've successfully completed BA work in at least 3 different environments.

BA SUPER HERO



BA Super Hero At this stage, you are confident you can succeed in any project situation – because you have succeeded and "proven" yourself to yourself in at least 3 different situations. At this level, you'll find that people request you to be assigned to your project and they trust you and your work.

If you got to this stage without formal training, well done! That means that your work is your genius work. However, this can also stop you at this step. Because the next level means confidence that you can succeed, but also that you can help others succeed.

Action Steps

1) Define Your Next Level Career Goal

First, you'll want to define your next-level career goal. Now, you actually don't have to take this step. If you are happy where you are at as a Super Hero, you can stay at this level for a long, long time. With expertise in different areas and highlevel contributions, you could even continue to receive promotions and salary increases within this stage.

But eventually, when you keep growing, you'll see you can expand your impact when you step above and beyond being an individual contributor and into a champion role.

Often, getting to the next level means letting go of project work, getting it all done, and doing it all yourself.

2) Train and Mentor Other Business Analysts

You need to learn to clone yourself, so you aren't the only one who can handle all the important projects. And to do that, you start trying to figure out why you are so successful and training and mentoring others to achieve similar kinds of successes.

One truth I've learned through developing online training programs is that the best way to learn is to actually teach. So don't wait until you've figured out why you are successful to start teaching others. Simply start. Share what you know and invite questions. As you answer these questions and help people with new challenges, your awareness of your keys to success will expand.

Look for mentees on your team, in other departments, or at local chapter meetings. There are always more people looking for mentors than can find them – so if you are not finding someone to mentor, there is an opportunity you aren't seeing. 




even when you aren't the BA and "in the details" of the project.

You are ready for more, and in this phase you've opened a lot of doors. You have your core BA skills, you've established a framework that trains others and ensures their success at a difficult role, and you have great communication skills. Now, what do you want your bigger contribution to be? The possibilities are endless!

Action Steps

Your Action Steps at this level will depend on the path you take. And there is really a menu of options here that you can choose from and combine.

- ➤ Management Elevate the awareness and value of the BA role in your organization. Create opportunities for other BAs to move along the Success Path through community building and development and creating an organizational career path.
- > Strategic BA Work This is work beyond the project level and can take the form of Business Architecture, Project Leadership, or Strategy Analysis.
- ➤ **Thought Leadership** this can take the form of starting a blog, speaking, publishing a book, starting a company, or training.
- Consulting Consulting opportunities can be either internal or external. You can be a project-based consultant at any level. At this level, you could be a consultant in the BA practice to assess and map out a maturity plan for a BA practice or PMO. Or you might be brought in to fix and clean-up failing projects – leaving a team behind you to execute.
